News - Laying hens: barren battery cage ban upheld

The RSPCA welcomes today's European Commission decision to uphold the ban on conventional battery cages but warns that the alternative - so-called 'enriched' cages - are little better.

Following a review of the Directive, the Commission announced today that conventional battery cages will be banned from 2012, despite some industry groups calling for a postponement. The report takes into account the demands of consumers and states that the welfare problems associated with conventional cages are inherent to the system.

However, many people don't realise that when the ban comes into force, eggs labelled 'eggs from caged hens' will still be available, produced in so-called 'enriched' cages and the RSPCA is renewing its campaign to get them out of cages once and for all.

All cages should be banned

Alice Clark, an RSPCA farm animal scientist, said: "Enriched cages are little better than the notorious battery cages. Little will change from the hens' point of view, so we are calling on the Government to ban all cages and are urging consumers not to buy eggs produced from them, especially as eggs are widely available from higher welfare barn and free-range systems.

"Channel 4's food season has made chickens a hot topic at the moment. But we don't want shoppers to think that when the ban comes into force there will be no more caged eggs on the supermarket shelves. In fact, they may simply come from hens kept in a different type of cage.

"Currently, some 37 per cent of eggs produced in the UK come from birds reared to higher welfare standards in cage-free systems. That's a heartening statistic especially as demand for these eggs has grown so rapidly over the last decade. Now we are asking all consumers to continue to support better welfare for hens by not buying eggs that come from any kind of cage."

Basic welfare needs still not met

While the RSPCA considers 'enriched' cages to be a small step forward compared with conventional barren battery cages, they still don't adequately meet even some of the most basic welfare needs of the birds. This includes not enough room to spread their wings properly or sufficient facilities to dustbathe effectively, leading to frustration and distress.

Eggs bearing the Freedom Food logo come from birds that are reared on farms inspected to RSPCA welfare standards and are free to move around in barn or free-range systems. The RSPCA's standards do not allow any type of battery cage - conventional or enriched.
